Dog Constraints Public Spaces Protection Order

Have you heard of Neospora? Neospora is in our Parish



Getting active and enjoying the fantastic countryside around Stanton and High Hatton is one of the great pleasures of living in this area. Dogs are commonly infected and act as carriers of a disease known as Neospora, which is a parasite passed in their faeces. Neospora infection often results in miscarriage in cattle and can be responsible for disease and death in sheep. Dogs are the main carriers of this dangerous parasite.

Owners picking up after their dog helps to reduce the risk of the disease spreading.

There are no drugs currently available to control this disease in cattle or to cure infected animals, nor is any vaccine licensed in the UK to prevent Neospora at the current time.

The effect of Neospora on cattle for farmers in this area has already been devastating with a local breeding herd in the Parish being infected, resulting in one third of the herd having to be destroyed.

Those who are taking to farmland with their pets are normally very good at keeping control of their dogs. However in the countryside it is often thought that there is no need to pick up after your dog. Many people are unaware of the impact leaving their pet's poo in fields can have on livestock and wider agriculture.

So, whilst people are encouraged to head out and make the most of the countryside, we all need to remember our obligations not just to control our pets but to clean up after them.

Summer security

We are urging people to particularly vigilant to burglaries as the warm weather arrives. During the summer months, doors and windows are often left open, making homes an easy target for thieves.

There are some simple but effective ways that you can protect your property:



Keep front, patio and back doors closed and locked when you are elsewhere in the house or the garden. Keep garden gates locked when you are away from the property. Ensure that windows and external doors on the ground floor are locked at night, and all doors and windows are locked when you are out of the house. Even a small window could provide a burglar with an opportunity to reach through and open a larger window to gain access. Remember to close downstairs windows when leaving a room, to deter the opportunist thief. Find out about property marking schemes such as Smartwater If an item is marked it will be much harder for a thief to sell on. Also, if recovered, stolen items can then be returned to their rightful owner. Look out for your neighbours' property if they are away for a few days. Joining your local Neighbourhood Watch Scheme is good way to meet those living on your street. Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators help to keep the local groups informed of criminal activity in the community, pass on crime prevention advice and help resolve local issues. Local members are encouraged to keep an eye on what's going and pass on details of suspicious activity.

Village Hall annual report for 2023-24

From the Chair:

The last year has been a successful one for the village hall.

The hall has been further refurbished in efforts to bring it up to date, to reduce future maintenance and costs and to meet Health & Safety Regulations.

The interior of the hall has been painted throughout, by Mr. Steve PUGH, resulting in a fresh, clean and modern look. The curtains in the main hall have been replaced with roller blinds, and six panes of glass, where seals had split, causing condensation, have been replaced. The glass in the interior doors has been replaced with safety glass. Two of the panel heaters in the hall have been replaced.

In the billiards room, emergency lighting has been installed, and the back door has been converted to a fire door. This will bring this room up to current safety standards. In addition, mains-fed wall panel heaters have been installed in this room to avoid the need for portable heaters. New, energy-efficient strip lights have replaced the old, faulty fluorescent strip lights. The electrical work was carried out by Insta-Lec Shropshire Ltd. There are plans for this room to be painted, the curtains to be replaced with blinds, and for carpet tiles to replace the worn-out, dirty and damaged carpet.

To aid electricity supply for outdoor events, a double external socket has been sited on the exterior front wall, outside the billiards room.

The hall continues to be hired on a weekly and monthly basis by two local groups, and there have been several private hirings. The monthly Neighbourhood Natter continues to be well-supported, and is much appreciated by those who attend. Our thanks go to Tony COLLINS for running this each month.

The committee organised a quiz and fish and chips night in November which was very well-attended. This was followed by a Christmas Fair in December which was similarly well-attended. The committee were most grateful to the Parish Council for their generous donation towards selection boxes which were gifts for children from Father Christmas. The donation enabled Father Christmas to give every child there a selection box, rather than charging to visit Father Christmas to get a gift, which may not have been within the reach of everyone's budget.

There were some selection boxes left over, these were gifted to Shawbury Primary School with the request that they be given to children who may not otherwise receive such an item. The school passed on their thanks for this.

In February the committee organised a table-top sale and coffee and cake morning. Although this was a new venture, it was well-attended and feedback was good.

It was noted recently that the rockery bed outside the hall had become very overgrown and looked untidy. This was also felt to be disrespectful to those who are commemorated there by shrubs and trees.

The rockery has been cleared and tidied, and now presents a much better appearance. It will be maintained twice a year by Furlads of Market Drayton. The Committee propose to plant a rose there in memory of the late Mrs Sue YOUNG who contributed so much to the running of the village hall over many years.

The village hall committee though few in number, work exceedingly hard both to promote the village hall and to organise events such as those mentioned. They are an amazing team and I am both grateful for, and proud of their achievements.



Keeping Shropshire Tidy

Freedom Fibre has distributed litter pick kits across North Shropshire in a bid to help keep Shropshire tidy.

Every parish in North Shropshire was invited to apply for a kit, consisting of litter pickers, bin bags and hoop-holders, gloves and 'Keep Shropshire Tidy' high-visibility jackets.

Work is now well under way across North Shropshire, with almost 30 kilometres of 'backbone' fibre installed. Many of our green 'active cabinets' have also been installed, with a single cabinet being able to provide lightning-fast broadband to around 5,000 premises. Our surveyors are currently out and about in many towns and villages across North Shropshire such as Hadnall, West Felton, and Burlton. Be sure to give them a wave if you see them!

Freedom Fibre's Freedom Fund is still open for applications. Good and green causes in North Shropshire can apply for their share of £25,000.

Grants can contribute to environmental projects such as solar panels, bird boxes or wildflower meadows. Information about new dog constraints Public Spaces Protection Order



Related topics: Highways, transport and environmental maintenance

Proposals were made to Shropshire Council's Cabinet in October 2023 to introduce a <u>Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO)</u> for <u>Shropshire</u> to help tackle dog fouling and nuisance, in response to public complaints.

Following an eight-week public consultation into the proposals, a small number of amendments were made, and Shropshire Council's Cabinet has recently agreed to introduce the PSPO. The order was made on Wednesday 17 April 2024 and is now subject to an appeal period of six weeks before it can come into force on Saturday 1 June 2024.

To appeal under Section 66 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, you must apply to the High Court within six weeks of the PSPO being made (17 April 2024). The order may be challenged in the High Court by anyone who lives, works in, or regularly visits the PSPO area.

There are two grounds on which the application to appeal against can be made:

- 1. The local authority was not empowered to issue the order, modify it, or add specific restrictions or conditions set by the order.
- 2. The PSPO requirements under the statute was not compiled with in relation to the order.

The High Court can suspend or stop the PSPO if it believes the local authority were not empowered to make or vary the PSPO. https://www.gov.uk/courts-tribunals/administrative-court

As per the order:

The PSPO will enable Shropshire Council and the police to issue fixed penalty notices of £100 – or £50 if paid within 10 days – to owners who allow their animal to foul pavements and public amenity spaces without clearing up afterwards.

- Dogs will also be excluded from fenced play and sports areas.
- Dogs will be required to wear a lead on the highway.
- Officers will also have the power to ask for a dog to be put on a lead in public areas where they are not under control of their owner or are acting aggressively.

Exemption from the order

The order will not apply to a person who:

- Is registered as a blind person in a register compiled under section 29 of the National Assistance Act 1948.
- Has a disability which affects their mobility, manual dexterity, physical co-ordination, or to lift, carry or otherwise move everyday objects, in respect of a
 dog trained by a prescribed charity upon which they rely for assistance.
- If the dog is a working dog, including dogs that are being used for work in connection with emergency search and rescue, herding or sheep herding animals, law enforcement and the work of the armed forces. These exemptions will only apply whilst the dog is working.

An Equalities and Social Inclusion Health Impact Assessment has been completed and anticipates a positive impact across the protected characteristic groupings and across the county, due to health and wellbeing benefits for everyone in the community, if there is less dog fouling as a result of this policy being implemented.

1 Education campaign

2 The PSPO will be implemented with a public education and information campaign advising on heath considerations, the impact of dog nuisance and the reasons for enforcement action. The campaign will aim to educate and encourage pet owners to act responsibly.

Dog mess plea after unborn calves lost

Dog-walkers are being urged to pick up their pets' mess after a parasite carried in faeces caused almost half a herd of pregnant cattle in the New Forest to

pregnant cattle in the New Forest to lose their calves. Tom Gould, a New Forest commoner, turned 38 cattle out to graze common land in the national park but 18 were found to have lost their calves after they were infected by neospora, a bovine parasite found in dog excrement. The parasite can survive in the soil for weeks if dog faeces is not picked up immediately and can make cows much more likely to abort. It can also affect future prepancies for years.

Gould, 43, who farms near Bransgore,

Hampshire, said the loss was "gut-wrenching" and that it would take him years to build his herd back up.
Commoners are people whose property gives them rights to graze livestock including cattle and ponies in the park.
He said "I'm not blaming dog owners because I don't think there is much awareness of this disease, but I'm hoping that by spreading the message we can stop this from becoming an even bigger problem in the New Forest.
"I am not the only commoner that has been affected. If the public can get on board and pick up their dog mess and take it home with them it could make a huge difference." Gould said the number of dogs being walked there had "increased dramatically".

Dr Alex Crook, of Cedar Farm Vets,

in Ringwood, said it was likely that the Hereford cross cattle became infected last spring after ingesting soil and grass contaminated by dog faeces. Blood tests showed the cattle had been exposed to neospora before they aborted. Crook said: "The danger is they are infected for the rest of their lives and current studies show they are six to seven times more likely to abort again." I do wonder if the increase in dog numbers and people using the forest during lockdown has increased the risk of it spreading throughout the forest. Please clear up after your dog responsibly—don't just throw it away. This disease can hang around in the environment for some time."

David Coombes, who runs the practice, said that if a neospora carrier

does make it through to calving, that calf will almost certainly be a carrier. "If it is destined to be a breeding heifer, then it is a real problem," he said.

Coombes said the parasite seemingly has no effect on dogs, so owners may be

has no effect on dogs, so owners may be unaware a dog is a carrier.

The New Forest Commoners Defence Association said: "We cannot enjoy the forest as we do without the work of the commoners so we would like to remind everyone to please follow the New Forest Code, pick up after your dogs and take the bags home."

The New Forest dog-walking code, which is promoted by the national park and backed by local groups, urges pet owners to "pick up after your dog" and put bagged waste in the bin.

The New Forest Dog Owners Group,

which represents hundreds of local dog owners, urged forest users to act responsibly but noted that neospora can also be spread by foxes. Heather Gould, from the group, said: "The New Forest Dog Owners Group is clear that any dog owner who doesn't look after their animal, the environment, or take care of livestock and wild animals, is behaving irresponsibly. This includes picking up dog poo when animals, is behaving irresponsibly. This includes picking up dog poo when possible and taking it to a bin or home for disposal. If it's not possible, owners should make sure it's away from areas used by humans and animals. Thousands of walks are undertaken every day across the New Forest, and sadly it is inevitable that occasionally there will be issues which we need to understand be issues which we need to understand and tackle."



Financial Cost to Farmers

The financial losses for farmers having to destroy livestock can be substantial. The average price for a bull is in the region of £10,000, however depending on pedigree this figure can vary enormously. In 2022 Welsh farmer Gerwyn Jones sold his first pedigree Limousin for £189,000. The current world record stands at \$1.5 million for a bull named SAV America 8018.
