If you've witnessed or been the victim of crime that isn't an emergency, please report it to us.

Your report will be sent direct to our control room. Before you give us the details of the crime, we'll ask you a few questions to make sure you go to the right online form.

CAN YOU HELP? | Appeal following burglary in Market Drayton

We are appealing for information following a burglary in Market Drayton in the early hours of this morning (Tuesday 3 March).

Officers were called to Queen Street shortly before 1am today following a report that a property had been broken into.

Upon attendance, officers located a man in his 30s outside of the property with injuries which he received medical treatment for.

A 56-year-old man was arrested on suspicion of grievous bodily harm. He remains in police custody.

A 36-year-old man was later arrested on suspicion of burglary. He also remains in police custody.

Enquiries have continued throughout the day, and officers are now appealing to anyone who might have information which could help with the investigation.

A man has been arrested after an estimated £17,000 worth of class B drugs was discovered in Whitchurch.

The arrest was made yesterday (Monday 2 March) by Whitchurch Safer Neighbourhood Team and Proactive CID at an address on Green End.

Officers discovered a large quantity class B drugs, with an estimated street value of around £17,000.

A man, aged 29, was arrested at the address for being concerned in the supply of class B drugs and remains in police custody as enquiries continue.

Inspector Matt Painter said: "Yesterday's arrest is the latest action taken against drug networks operating in the north of Shropshire. One man has been detained and remains in custody, and is assisting us with our enquiries.

"We will continue to act on all intelligence provided to us. Drugs have no place in our communities, and we are committed to making north Shropshire a hostile environment for anyone involved in the supply of controlled substances."

During a search of the property, officers located and seized suspected Class A drugs. The suspect is now in custody while enquiries continue.

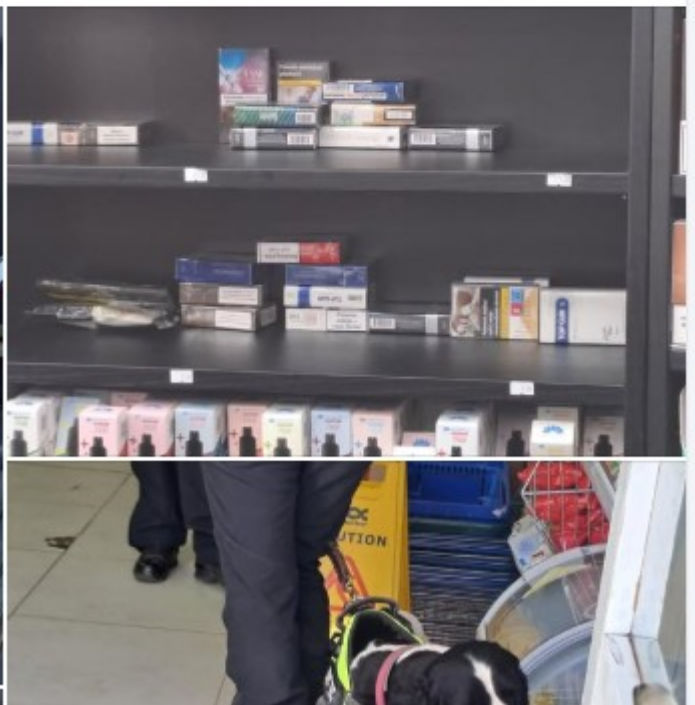

Good Afternoon Everyone,

My name is Matt Painter, and I wanted to take a moment to introduce myself as your new Neighbourhood Policing Inspector for North Shropshire.

Now that I've been let loose on our social media account, I'd like to share a bit about my background and outline my plans for the months ahead. My policing career so far has taken me through a wide range of roles — Serious and Organised Crime, Proactive Drugs Teams, Custody Sergeant, the Force Incident Manager role in the Control Room (including firearms and pursuit command), and most recently, Response Inspector in Telford.

It's been a varied few years, and I'm keen to bring that experience into strengthening neighbourhood policing here in North Shropshire. I've spent my first week out and about with the team, getting to know the officers, listening to what matters most locally, and identifying the priorities we need to focus on. It's already clear how committed the team is to keeping our communities safe.

Over the coming months, you'll see us delivering more community engagement events, targeted policing operations, and a number of pre-planned warrants linked to the issues you've told us are priorities. My commitment is simple: visible policing, meaningful engagement (both online and in person), and a problem-solving approach shaped by what YOU want from your neighbourhood team.

I'm looking forward to meeting more of you — and getting away from the desk! Whether it's on the doorstep, at a community meeting, or out on patrol, I'll be out and about listening to what matters to you.

One quick ask from me: please take a moment to complete the survey linked below. Your feedback helps shape where we patrol, when we're there, and what local policing activity looks like. I'll follow up with our actions in a simple "You Said, We Did" format so you can see the difference your views make.


I'm a firm believer that policing works best when it's shaped by the community it serves — and your views genuinely help us get this right.

 Please take a few minutes to complete our Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) survey.

As mentioned, your views help shape where we patrol, when we're there, and what we prioritise. ASB looks different in every neighbourhood, so hearing directly from you gives us the clearest picture of what's happening within a 15-minute walk of your home.

This work supports the national Neighbourhood Policing Guarantee and the Police and Crime Commissioner's Safer Communities Plan. The more feedback we receive, the better we can work with our partners to tackle local issues and keep our communities safe.

Once the survey closes, I'll share the results and our actions in a simple "You Said, We Did" update so you can see the impact of your voice.

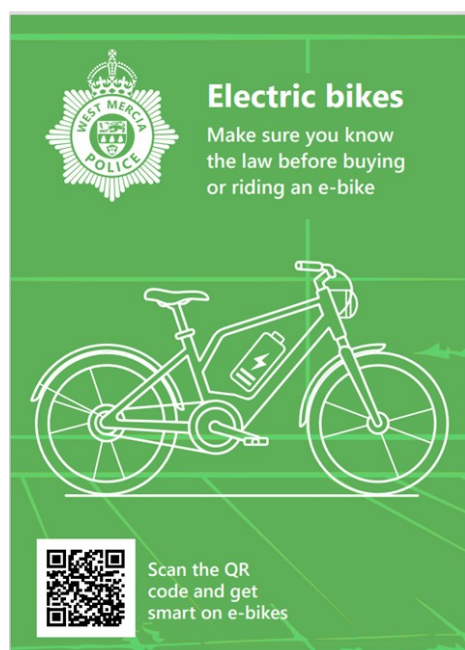

In order to be used on our roads electric bikes (electrically assisted pedal cycles EAPCs) must meet specific criteria. To be classified as an electric bike:

- Pedals must be in motion for the motor assistance to be provided.
- The motor used must be of no more than 250 Watts (maximum continuous rated power).
- Electric assistance can only be provided to a maximum of 15.5mph.
- The rider must be 14 years of age or over.


EAPCs can be ridden anywhere a regular bicycle is permitted, including roads, cycle lanes, and bridleways, but cannot be ridden on pavements (unless specifically designated for cycling).

Modifying an electric bike and not adhering to the above laws can render it illegal for road use and may subject it to motorcycle or moped regulation.


Anyone found not adhering to these laws will be dealt with as appropriate.

Electric scooters
Make sure you know the law before buying or riding an e-scooter.



Get smart on e-scooters by watching this.



Although e-scooters are available to buy, they are currently illegal to use on public roads, pavements, cycle lanes and pedestrian-only areas unless part of a legal e-scooter loan scheme. As there are no legal schemes in place in Herefordshire, Shropshire or Worcestershire, e-scooters can only be ridden on private land with the permission of the land-owner.

E-scooters are currently classed as Personal Light Electric Vehicles (PLEVs) by the Government and fall under the same laws and regulations that apply to all motor vehicles in terms of requiring insurance, tax, MOT, licence and registration.

There is no mechanism in place at the moment to obtain any of these for e-scooters so as this requirement can't be met, their use in public areas is illegal. Anyone found using them in public areas risks having the e-scooter seized by the police.

West Mercia Police Ride Along Scheme

Ever wondered what it's really like to work in your community, tackling local issues and keeping people safe day to day? Now's your chance to find out!

Are you aware of Community Speed Watch, and is it relevant to your parish?

With Community Speed Watch now in its eighth year of operation within West Mercia, local communities are being reminded about the scheme and how volunteers can get involved in speed monitoring and improve the quality of life in their area if speeding traffic is causing concern.

Community Speed Watch is a community driven road safety initiative, coordinated by West Mercia Police but managed and run by volunteers in the community. It involves trained volunteers from the community monitoring the speeds of vehicles with approved, hand-held speed measurement devices. Where vehicle speeds are found to be inappropriate, a letter is sent to the registered keeper by the police with the aim of encouraging them to reduce their speed when driving in the future.

The scheme was introduced within West Mercia in 2014 and has gone from strength to strength over the last 8 years with over 40 active sites currently operating. It was introduced to enhance the force's speed enforcement strategy, by addressing community concerns in areas that do not meet either speed or collision criteria for police-led enforcement.

A Community Speed Watch scheme is initiated when 'speeding traffic' has been identified as a community road safety concern by a parish council or Safer Neighbourhood Team. However, several criteria must be met before a scheme can be established:

- The area must have a 30mph or 40mph speed restriction.
- Speed data collected by West Mercia Police must show that speed levels in the area do not meet the national industry requirements for police enforcement.
- No other enforcement activity is currently in place.
- There must be at least six volunteers in each Community Speed Watch scheme.
- Speed checks must be conducted by at least three volunteers at any one time.





As part of Operation Snap, members of the public can report and submit digital footage showing potential traffic offences via a secure online form.

This can range from driving dangerously or carelessly to overtaking on solid white lines, using a mobile phone while driving, ignoring traffic lights or dangerous driving around other road users, such as horse riders and cyclists.

Please note; issues with number plates, windscreens and minor traffic offences are unable to be dealt with via Op Snap.

General parking complaints (other than illegal parking on zig zags) should be raised with the relevant local authority. Notification of untaxed vehicles can be reported directly to DVLA, reports of no MOT or no insurance should be logged to 101, not via the Op Snap portal.

Your submission will be sent to West Mercia Police where the evidence will be reviewed by one of our road traffic police officers.

One statement is required for each submission/offending vehicle. We are unable to process multiple offences sent as one submission.

We will strive to update each submitter regarding the outcome of their allegation. All submissions are dealt with pro-actively to help reduce risk taking and poor driving on our counties roads.

Any footage submitted through the portal can be used by us to help educate other road users and to advise on case results.

Please note - if you operate a recording device in a public place, you may have obligations under the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). It is in your interest to familiarise yourself, and comply with, any such obligations as apply to you. If you are in any doubt as to your obligations, please obtain independent legal advice to ensure you do not put yourself at risk of prosecution. By submitting footage you acknowledge you have read and understood this before proceeding.

'WalkSafe' - Personal safety app launched across West Mercia

West Mercia Police has launched a personal safety app, which aims to help people feel more confident when out and about during the busy festive period.

WalkSafe is available to people across Herefordshire, Shropshire and Worcestershire and provides users with a list of safety-trained venues, including bars, restaurants and other premises that meet recognised standards through schemes such as Licensed Security & Vulnerability Initiative (LSAVI) and Best Bar None.

The app also allows people to plan their route home, share their journey with trusted friends or family and make use of an SOS alert button if they feel unsafe.

The introduction of WalkSafe across West Mercia supports ongoing work to improve safety in public spaces, particularly for women and girls.

WalkSafe is backed by West Mercia's Police and Crime Commissioner and is funded through the Home Office. It will be available all year round.

There is now a new national cyber crime and fraud service called **Report Fraud**.

This replaces Action Fraud, which has been around since 2009, and is completely new service for reporting and responding to cyber crime and fraud. It will provide an end-to-end service, from how reports of cyber crime and fraud can be made, to how reports are analysed and how victims are supported.

Report Fraud has been designed and delivered by the City of London Police, who are the national policing lead for fraud, in close partnership with the National Crime Agency along with banking, tech and victim services.

How does Report Fraud differ from Action Fraud?

- Law enforcement agencies will be able to share data to and / or from the new service.
- The new service will assist in taking down websites, bank accounts and other channels through which criminal activity takes place.
- It will provide specialist advice and support to victims of crime.
- Be able to take forward investigations into reports of criminal activity.
- Use trends on threats at international, national, regional and local level.

Report Fraud will:

- Make it easier for anyone from any background or demographic to report cyber crime and fraud.
- Inform victims about what has happened or is happening with their report.
- Quickly and efficiently inform victims when their crime report has contributed towards the protection of others.
- Protect a greater number of people and businesses from the risk of cyber crime and fraud through delivery of targeted and timely advice on how to avoid the latest threats.
- Significantly improve the speed and quality of information provided to law enforcement partners, boosting their chances of successful prosecutions.
- Block and disrupt crime through providing real-time information to those institutions and organisations who can deter and disrupt fraudulent websites, bank accounts, and other activities enabling criminality.

INTRODUCING SMARTWATER®

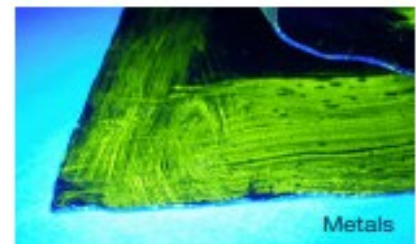


WHAT IS SMARTWATER?

SmartWater is a sophisticated security system that protects property, deters thieves and helps the police to convict criminals. It can be directly applied to valuables or it can be used to spray criminals committing a crime. SmartWater contains a unique forensic code that is registered to an address or location. Anything marked can be traced back to where it came from, allowing the police to identify stolen property and link criminals to crime scenes. SmartWater is almost invisible in natural light but glows brightly under ultraviolet (UV) light.

WHERE IS SMARTWATER USED?

- Homes use SmartWater to protect electrical goods, jewellery and other valuables.
- Many businesses protect IT equipment, infrastructure and tools.
- Shops and banks use it to deter robberies.
- Railways are marking trackside cable.
- Cars, vans, bikes, boats, and other vehicles can all use SmartWater.
- Farms and rural communities are protecting machinery and stoneware (including paving and dry stone walls).
- Many schools protect their IT and sports equipment.
- Utility firms apply SmartWater to metals and cables.
- Thousands of Churches use SmartWater on lead roofing.
- Many Cash-in-transit cashboxes are fitted with SmartWater.
- Retail chains are using SmartWater to reduce pilferage and internal theft.
